Conference Topic

Universities in Europe seem to become more and more sensitive to and aware of the importance of the social dimension of their teaching and their research, and many are currently developing strategies and actions to make this a priority, not only in policy terms, but also in daily practice of staff and students. University's Social Responsibility (USR) is discussed under different headings such as social responsibility, social dimension, third mission, university-business cooperation, civic engagement, technology transfer, and many more. Each university has challenged to define their areas and focus of USR and its (yearly) focus, as USR is considered a broad topic ("puzzle"). Many activities contribute to reaching the overarching objective of socially responsible action towards stakeholders. Nevertheless, universities must avoid falling into the trap of turning social responsibility into another standardized policy they have to follow, and which is measured, audited and controlled according to specific requirements. The key aspect of USR is the awareness of the impact that research and teaching have, and the desire to have as much of a positive impact on stakeholders as possible.

Focal points of the conference:

1. Topic: Strategic Planning

- How do universities raise awareness within their higher education institutions for USR (faculty level, student level, teachers' level, within leadership etc.)?
- How can universities build capacities for USR within the university? (internal trainings, material, resource planning, departments, etc.)
- Which strategies and action plans are in place for USR? Which strategies are implemented to actively reduce barriers for USR within the university?
- How do universities identify relevant focus points for USR-purposes within the university (relevant activities, transferable research, governance processes, transfer action plans, documentation processes, etc.)?
- How can societal requirements from the multi-stakeholder environment from outside the university be determined and analysed for USR? (needs analysis, the role of transfer offices, formats of cooperation etc.) How do universities conduct stakeholder consultations? In which forms are stakeholders involved in university research?
- How do universities identify success factors and indicators for USR?

2. Topic: Good Practices

- Public and social engagement as examples for social responsibility
- Knowledge transfer: Communicating research to the wider general public
- Cooperating with industry partners
- Transfer offices and examples for responsible science

The UNIBILITY-Project and wider USR-Network

The UNIBILITY-project (2015-2017), coordinated by the University of Vienna (Austria), is one of the pioneer projects in Europe for active social responsibility. It is co-funded by the Erasmus+ Programme (Strategic Partnerships, Key Action 2), Grant Agreement No.: 2015-1-AT01_K203-005033.

Within the UNIBILITY-project a focus was put on the relationship of universities and the local community, regional stakeholders, civic engagement and other activities relating to external university contexts (social dimension).

We are a partnership of six universities from Austria, Spain, Romania, Slovenia, Ireland, and Portugal, and one European network (www.eucen.eu). We have already developed the following material:

How to reach the venue

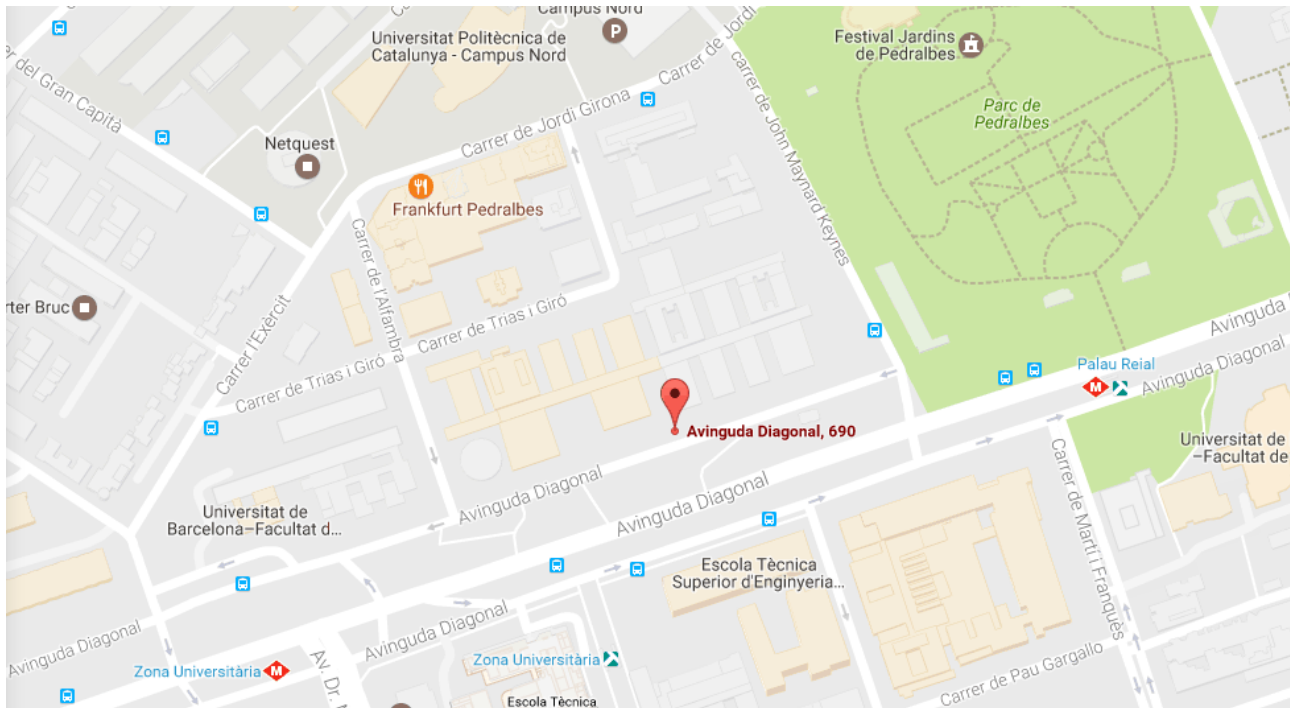

Arriving by plane:

The closest airport for Barcelona is Aeroport de Barcelona - el Prat <http://www.barcelona-airport.com/>. There are several options to get to the city:

- **Metro Underground** connects both terminals of the Airport with Barcelona underground network since February 2016. The line is called L9 Sud. There are stops at T1 (inside the building) and T2 (outside the building, next to train station), in both cases follow the signs. The L9 Sud runs directly from Barcelona Airport to Zona Universitaria. You can walk from Zona Universitaria to the Faculty of Economics and Business or you can take there the L3 and after only one stop you will arrive to Palau Reial: <http://www.tmb.cat/en/l9-sud>
- **Aero Bus** is the fastest way to reach Barcelona city Centre with public transport. There are two lines that connect T1 and T2 with Plaça Catalunya. The price per single ticket: 5,90EUR. The stops are Plaça de Catalunya, Sepúlveda-Urgell, Plaça d'Espanya and Airport T1 and T2: <http://www.aerobusbcn.com/en/>
- **Train R2 Nord** from T2 to the city centre stops at Estacio de Sants, Passeig de Gràcia and El Clot. The entrance to the train station is in T2B. Follow the signs for RENFE. If you are arriving or departing from T1 you will not be able to walk to or from the train station. It is necessary to catch one of the free shuttle buses that run between the train station and T1.
